Financial Aid for the Novice - Part One: Filing the FAFSA (Nikki Vachon) Have you noticed that the FAFSA filing experience (including the number of questions asked) isn't the same for every student? In this session we'll explain why that is by walking through the FAFSA and demonstrating how skip logic works. We'll also discuss whose information is required on the FAFSA, share tips to avoid pitfalls, and answer other common questions.
