- College- goers include:

What students need to do:

Get Excited!

- It's an exciting time; encourage students to celebrate their acceptance.
- Be their cheerleader to keep the momentum going
- Encourage them to show school spirit and share their accomplishment



Get Organized!

- Make sure they gather & complete all paperwork(many are time sensitive)
 - Deposit
 - Housing forms
 - Immunization records
 - Financial aid related paperwork
- Get registered for classes
- Create a plan to pay the bill





Get Connected!

- Activate and regularly check student email account and campus portal
- Participate in orientation (in-person or virtually)
- Follow their school's social media accounts
- Visit campus (in-person if able) and locate important offices:
 - Registrar
 - Financial aid
 - Billing
 - Student support center



Get Funded!


- Confirm students have filed a FAFSA
- Have them complete all financial aid related paperwork in a timely manner
 - Verification
 - Promissory Notes & Loan items
 - Work study paperwork
- Review scholarships





• Get Financially Fit!

- Encourage students to:
 - continue searching and applying for scholarships throughout the summer
 - work and save as much money as possible
 - open and/or contribute to a college savings plan
 - consider a payment plan to reduce remaining balance
- If students plan to borrow beyond federal loans, recommend they review credit score/history





...but some things are different, depending on what type of college-goer the student is.



- Students who are transferring colleges and/or adults returning to college after a break:
 - Obtain transcript(s) from prior college(s)
 This may mean paying off old balances
 - Make sure new school is listed on the FAFSA
 - Make sure any prior loans are in good standing
 - Ask admissions for a Prior Learning Assessment
 - Connect with employer to ask about tuition assistance

Time Off

Gap year plan

- Encourage students to stay connected to college email, social media, news & events
- Connect with college to see if they need to reapply for admissions, if merit remains the same etc.
- Suggest ways to make the most of the gap year

Time Off

"Figuring it out"



- Students may not have a plan but may not be ready for next steps yet
- Suggest they think about their passions and interests; can they make money from it? Is there a related educational field?
- Suggest adult education offerings in their area
- Encourage career exploration...which brings us to...



The next step for some is going to work.







Areas for Career Exploration

- Career Center
- Adult Education
- Industry specific training such as Cianbro Institute
- Maine Career Compass
- Maine Community Colleges



Students already working

- Encourage them to ask about tuition assistance for earning a credential of value
- Consider stackable workplace training/industryspecific certifications etc.
- Put emphasis on saving money; they may need to pay for education later





Long-term Career Planning

- Have them map out possible career paths
- Remind them to examine transferrable skills
- Consider pandemic impact
- Discuss adding degrees/credentials for more earning & promotion potential



Let's not forget the military as an option!





Military Pathway

Training AND Educational Opportunities

- Military service has the benefit of offering skills training AND educational training
- Certain military roles/jobs can lead directly to a career after active duty
- Students who are in the military may have access to education benefits to help them pay for their education



It's also possible that students might not have a plan at all!





Present students with options

- Ask what is holding them back from one of these pathways
- Suggest a job/military shadow
- Remind students that there is no right or wrong pathway or timeline
- Explain the benefits of each path
- Be a champion/cheerleader



Find ways to stay connected with students

- Encourage them to connect with school social media
- Ask them to join alumni groups
- Provide resources for each pathway
- Find peer mentoring opportunities
